"AN ANGEL ON EARTH"

EUGENIA SUMITE OKOSHI

Born in America, but reared in Japan, and now residing in New York, Eugenia Okoshi bridges the two lands in her art. Memory from her childhood and adolescence in Japan comes forth in her simple and bold compositions, dominated by juxtaposed forms and colors. At times, she uses subtle hues of muted grays, blacks, browns and reds, creating serene imagery, enlivened by poetic richness and delicacy of surface textures.

In one group of her paintings, configuration of landscape emerges through the curvilinear forms, symbolising horizons, valleys, streams and shorelines. Violent clashes of contrasting colors of ochre and blue ebb and flow of moving patterns create tensions, yet are held in unison to express her inner sentiments.
